

## QUESTIONNAIRE RESPONSE St. Norbert – Seine River Ward

## Markus Chambers

1. Public transit was identified as the most important issue facing Winnipeggers in the 2019 budget consult, followed by active transportation and roadway construction and maintenance. In your opinion, why is public transit deemed the number one priority?

Public transit is important as it is one of the key ways that connects all areas of the city. For students and youth in and around the University of Manitoba, this is a key way to commute to the university and thus get to work and classes. With more and more residents concerned about traffic and the environment, increased use of public transit is a way to both reduce automobile traffic on our roadways as well as decrease the amount of greenhouse gas emissions with increased hybrid buses.

I will work with Transit Planners to host a series of open houses to discuss with residents existing routes, ridership, and potential new routes to improve transit services in the community. I want to explore innovative solutions that are a win-win for all!

3. Safety is an increasing concern for transit riders and drivers, alike. What do you feel contributes to the lack of safety in the current system? How would you improve safety?

I feel that what contributes to the lack of safety in the current system is not frequent enough service. I have been told that residents of St. Norbert-Seine Rivers would like more regional bus routes, that is routes that circle the region and neighbourhood rather than the bus routes that span across the city from south to north or west to east.
